Operational Area

State- Jharkhand

Jharkhand is the land of forests situated in the eastern part of India. The state shares its border with the states of West Bengal to the east, Chhattisgarh to the west, Uttar Pradesh to the northwest, Bihar to the north and Odisha to the south. It is the 15th largest state by area, and the 14th largest by population. There are 24 districts in the



state and Jharkhand has 14 Lok Sabha constituencies, with 8 seats are for general candidates and 6 seats reserved for SC/ST candidates. The Jharkhand Legislative Assembly consists of 81 seats.

Areas of Intervention

In the year 2024–25, Veer Jharkhand Vikas Seva Manch (VJVSM) continued to build upon its strong foundation of community-centered development by sustaining and scaling up its key intervention areas.

1. Menstrual Hygiene Management Empowering adolescent girls

With generous support from the Linde Foundation, we expanded our menstrual health intervention in 7 Kasturba Gandhi Balika Vidyalayas (KGBVs) of Chatra district.

Installed two sanitary napkin vending machines and one incinerator in each of the 7 KGBVs. Conducted sessions



on menstrual hygiene, breaking taboos, and fostering a culture of openness and dignity among adolescent girls. Ensured access to hygiene facilities so that menstruation no longer disrupts education. This project not only addressed hygiene but also contributed to girls' school retention, self-confidence, and health outcomes. We also engaged school staff and female wardens in orientation programs to create a supportive environment. Peer educators were selected and trained to promote sustainable menstrual hygiene practices. Feedback from students showed a noticeable shift in attitudes and increased awareness. The initiative is now being looked at as a replicable model for other districts.

2. Food Security & Household Essentials



Supporting vulnerable families with nutrition and clean energy Under our ongoing collaboration with the Jiv Daya Foundation, we responded to the continued need for basic food and energy resources in underserved communities of Koderma district: Distributed 30 kg of food grains to 150 individuals, focusing on tribal and economically weak households. Provided 25 solar lamps to families without regular access to electricity, ensuring light for children's studies, women's safety, and improved quality of life. These interventions brought immediate relief and

long-term benefits, reducing energy poverty while enhancing food security. Additionally, awareness sessions were conducted on efficient food utilization and solar lamp maintenance to ensure sustainability. Community members shared how the lamps have helped extend productive hours in the evening. Local youth were engaged in the distribution process, strengthening community participation. This initiative has laid the groundwork for scaling up clean energy solutions and improving nutritional resilience.

3. Child Well-being & Educational Support Nurturing childhood

A total of 155 children between the ages of 6 months and 5 years were provided with a glass of milk six days a week through their local Anganwadi centres. This initiative was designed to address chronic undernutrition and support the healthy physical and cognitive development of children during their most formative years. The regular milk distribution also helped strengthen the role of Anganwadi centres as local hubs of early childhood care and



nutrition. We also focused on improving their learning environment and

self-esteem: Distributed shoes, socks, T-shirts, jackets with JDG logo, and trackpants to 75 children, many of whom come from remote tribal hamlets. Provided educational kits (notebooks, pens, pencils, bags) to 50 children to ensure they attend school with dignity and readiness. These initiatives helped reduce school absenteeism, boosted morale, and gave children a sense of inclusion and identity.

4. Nukkad Nataks for Rights Awareness Spreading awareness through creative and community-friendly mediums

With the active support of the Zila Jansampark Vibhag, we revitalized our popular Nukkad Natak (street play) campaign across various villages

These plays were conducted in local dialects, making the content more relatable, especially for women, elders, and youth.



The street plays successfully bridged the gap between policy awareness and practical access, empowering villagers to claim their entitlements. The campaign reached over 2,000 villagers across 15 locations, generating meaningful discussions and on-the-spot clarifications. Volunteers were stationed post-performance to distribute information leaflets and assist with form filling. Many attendees expressed gratitude for this creative, accessible form of civic education. The initiative has since inspired local youth groups to replicate similar performances independently.

The Foundation's emphasis on preventive care and education aligns deeply with our mission of inclusive rural development.

- 3. Zila Jansampark Vibhag We sincerely appreciate the collaboration with the Zila Jansampark Vibhag, whose support brought cultural vibrancy and awareness to our community outreach efforts. Through street plays and public performances, we were able to educate rural populations on government schemes and citizen rights in an engaging, relatable manner. Their cooperation helped us bridge the gap between policy and people, using local language and art to empower communities with knowledge.
- 4. We extend our deep appreciation to the Government of Jharkhand for its ongoing support and cooperation. As a key institutional partner, the state government has played an important role in enabling access to rights, schemes, and services for rural citizens. Through its departments and



local bodies, the government has supported our community-level work and provided an enabling environment for people-centric development. We remain committed to working hand-in-hand with state institutions to advance the vision of a just, inclusive, and empowered Jharkhand

In the coming year, we aim to strengthen our ongoing programs while also identifying new opportunities to deepen our engagement with tribal, Dalit, and other underserved groups. We will continue to build the capacities of community leaders, youth, and women so they can drive local change and influence decision-making at the grassroots level. Our focus will also remain on forging stronger partnership with government departments, donors, and civil society networks-to scale proven interventions and co-create sustainable solutions. Additionally, we aspire to integrate more digital tools and participatory monitoring methods into our field processes to enhance transparency and accountability. Above all, we will continue to listen, learn, and evolve-guided by the voices, struggles, and hopes of the communities we serve. The path ahead is filled with both challenges and possibilities, and we are confident that with collective strength and shared purpose, Veer Jharkhand Vikas Seva Manch will continue to be a catalyst for transformation and justice.
